



Paul S. Grogan became the President and CEO of the Boston Foundation in 2001. He joined the Foundation from Harvard University, where he served as Vice President for Government, Community and Public Affairs from 1999 to 2001. He was also a Senior Lecturer at the Harvard Business School. From 1986 through 1998, he was President and CEO of the nonprofit Local Initiatives Support Corporation. Mr. Grogan's passion for cities began in Boston where he served Mayors Kevin H. White and Raymond L. Flynn in a variety of staff and line positions. He headed Boston's neighborhood revitalization efforts in the early 80s, where he pioneered a series of public/private ventures that have been widely emulated by other cities. Mr. Grogan graduated with a degree with honors in American History from Williams College in 1972 and earned a Masters degree in Administration from the Harvard Graduate School of Education in 1979. Mr. Grogan is the co-author, with Tony Proscio, of the book *Comeback Cities: A Blueprint for Urban Neighborhood Revival*, which was published in 2000. He and his wife, Karen Sunnarborg, a city planner, are raising three sons in the Jamaica Plain neighborhood of Boston.
